1. Introduction

Forestry is a key industry in Scotland producing around 6m tonnes of wood¹ to create a myriad of renewable and sustainable natural products replacing fossil based materials in applications ranging from construction to biodegradable plastics. This activity generates £1.1Bn GVA and creates more than 34,000 jobs², whilst the trees we grow are sequestering 7.6m tonnes of CO2 each year, the equivalent of 14% of Scotlands gross greenhouse gas emissions³.




Figure 1: Scottish timber production and processing statistics (2023).

Like many industries, forestry is highly reliant on diesel HGVs to transport materials within and between every stage of the value chain (Fig. 1). However, many of the rural roads in Scotland were constructed early last century and were not designed to support modern 44 tonne lorry configurations which can, in some cases, lead to negative impacts such as noise or congestion, or emissions. Unlike other industries though, forestry is dedicated to proactively identifying and actively reducing these impacts wherever possible through the Strategic Timber Transport Fund (STTF).

Since its inception in 2005, the STTF and the work it supports has reduced the impacts of more than 1Bn tonnes of timber being transported on Scotlands communities, our environment, and our road networks.

The purpose of this paper is to give an annual update on the current position (at 1st April 2025) of the Strategic Timber Transport Fund (STTF) which supports both the <u>Strategic Timber Transport Scheme</u> (STTS) and the <u>TimberLINK</u> public service shipping contract.

2. Background

2025 is an auspicious year for forestry haulage as the STTF has been operating for 20 years, and TimberLINK in service for 25 years.

Although TimberLINK actually started in 2000, in part due to windblown timber arising from the major storms of 1999, the original STTF of £13m was introduced in 2005 for a three year period. Subsequently, it was extended for a further three years to 2011 with an annual budget of £5m which included a maximum £1m allocation to the TimberLINK shipping service. The fund continued thereafter with a budget of £3m/year (including TimberLINK) until 2016. Subsequently, the SF contribution was reduced to £2.85m enhanced with an extra £5 million from Transport Scotland giving 7.85m/year until 2019.

In 2019, the SF contribution was reduced to £2 million giving £7m/year to 2020. The 2020-21 budget of £7m increased to £8m to support Covid-19 recovery then the 2021-22, and 2022-23 budgets were both set at £7m. In 2023, the Transport Scotland contribution reduced to £2m such that the budget became £4m in total, and then the additional contribution ceased leaving £2m for the 2024-25 cycle. The 2025-26 budget is £2 million.

The aims and objectives of the STTF remain the same:

'To facilitate the sustainable transport of timber in rural areas of Scotland for the benefit of local communities and the environment, maximising the value of monies available through innovative projects and partnerships'

3. Process

The STTF supports two complimentary mechanisims, the TimberLINK shipping service (section 4.7) and the STTS challenge fund. It is managed and delivered by Scottish Forestry.

The STTS is a competetive fund designed to ensure only the best projects which deliver the most social and environmental benefits are supported. To achieve this, submitted applications are assessed and scored against a series of fixed criteria by a panel of independent experts recruited across public and private forest businesses, and local authority roads departments. Projects also increasingly engage with and consult community groups at the design stage.

Awards are then prioritised by scoring until the budget is used up, with remaining projects (which were suitable) then forming a list of potential projects should further budget become available later in the year. STTS projects are normally cofunded by applicants, and work programmes must be completed within the award year (by end of March following year).

3. Summary of Applications to Date

Since 2005, there has been 32 STTS rounds with 586 applications received in total and of these, 423 projects receiving awards.

In addition, there has also been three extraordinary rounds following the extreme winters of 2009-2010 and 2010-2011 when prolonged periods of sub-zero temperatures resulted in extraordinary damage to public roads, and as a result of significant, frequent storm events Autumn/Winter season 2023 which saw record numbers of flood warnings by the Scottish Environment Protection Agency (Sepa). 4. Recent Awards

The following is a summary of the project applications delivered in Round 32 which covers the 12 months since the last update in April 2024⁴.

4.1 Project Officers

The STTF continues to support the Project Officer advisory service posts serving the six <u>Regional Timber Transport Groups</u> in Scotland, and the national level <u>Timber Transport Forum</u> Executive Officer role.

These regional Timber Transport Groups provide local platforms to gather forecast information on forest exit points and timber volumes coming onto the public road network over the following fifteen years to help local authorities target investment and plan road maintenance. It also helps the forestry sector and Timber Transport Groups attract national funding for infrastructure and focus attention on where to manage timber transport to minimise the impacts on roads and communities.

The forum also enables direct coordination and collaboration with similar stakeholder groups in Cumbria and North East England, North Yorkshire and Wales as Scotland is a net exporter of wood and wood products so a lot of timber crosses the border.




Figure 4: Where roads aren't available or suitable, floating piers are sometimes used to extract timber by sea.

The Project Officer roles, which are cofunded by industry partners, are critical to the effective functioning of timber transport as they (individually and collectively) support the day to day work of the groups in coordinating haulage, manage the <u>Agreed Route Maps</u>⁵, support strategic planning and complex operations through <u>Timber Transport Management Plans</u> (TTMPs), develop and promote <u>best practice</u>, advance timber transport innovation including <u>decarbonisation</u>, maintain and strengthen partnership working, facilitate effective communication, consultation and coordination to avoid or reduce issues across local, regional and national levels and most importantly, act as a critical liaison between the forest industry and community stakeholders to encourage better understanding of purpose and needs, and enable collaboration towards positive outcomes.

This <u>voluntary</u> system provides a framework for liaison between forestry interests and local authority roads departments to develop solutions that enable timber transport, addresses community concerns, and protects the road.

4.2 Public Roads

Since April 2024, nine projects have delivered improvements to the public road network.

In **Aberdeenshire**, the 2025-26 STTS programme allocated support to upgrade the severely deteriorated B976 which serves the communities of Birsemore and Aboyne, numerous local businesses, commuters, significant numbers of visiting tourists, and the local sawmill which draws timber from Birse and Glentanner, and further afield. These works improved 4,800 sq.m. of carriageway over a distance of 900 m with a further 300 sq.m. of full depth reconstruction and edge strengthening, and 50m of new drainage systems to improve ponding situations on the carriageway. This project was awarded £101,000 realising a total spend of £202,000 through partnership with Aberdeen Council to reduce the impacts of 140,000 tonnes of timber transport over the next decade.

In the **Scottish Borders**, the B637 at Saughtree Grain and the B709 between Innerleithen golf club and Colquhar received awards. The B637 is a principle connecting route between the Borders region and Dumfries and Galloway, and a key link through to Keilder and its amenities, and northern England. Similarly, the B709 has direct access from a number of farms and residential properties, various holdiay lets and hospitality businesses and provides access to the A96 and A7 for commuters.

In both cases, the resurfacing/improvement works were required to improve the utilisation of the road. These projects, which upgraded and strenthened the carriageways, provided new passing places, and improved drainage were awarded £211,532 realising £423,065 improvements with co-funding from Scottish Borders Council to promote reduced impacts for 1,400,000 tonnes of timber over the next decade.

Ayrshire received awards for two roads in 2024-25 namely, the C1 Newton Stewart road and the B7045 at Maybole. The poor condition of the C1 road impacts on the local communities particularly the villages of Straiton, Crosshill, Dalmellington, Kirkmichael, Maybole and Newton Stewart, tourists and other local businesses. Similarly, the B7045, which serves communities in

Ayr, Dalrymple, Minishant, Kirkmichael, Maybole had reached a state of "major deterioration". Both roads are critical supply routes for the timber transport and timber processing industries in Ayrshire and beyond. These projects, which strengthened and upgraded the running surface and edges, and improved drainage, were awarded £161,150 which was match funded by the Ayrshire Roads Alliance to afford £323,500 of works which will support sutainable transportation of 2,000,000 tonnes of timber over the next ten years.

The **Highland** region benefitted from two STTS awards in 2024-25. The U1991 at Glenglass was an excluded route due to the poor condition of a bridge, a landslip at one point, and various other structural defects adding significant distance onto the journey for timber lorries. Simlarly, the U1019 at Bohenie was, in sections, sinuous causing large vehicles to overrun and cause edge damage and the few/small passing places were making it difficult for local residents to manoeuvre when meeting with timber lorries and other large vehicles.

Both projects focused on strengthening and upgrading the carriageway, formalising passing places, and improving drainage, and the Glenglass works also installed an upgraded bridge (Fig. 7). These projects, which totalled £766,565 were awarded £356,876 with cofunding from the Highland Council to reduce the impacts of 119,000 tonnes of timber transportation over the next decade.

Dumfries and Galloway received support towards the C102a at Boreland. The C102a, which serves forests including the Laverhay complex, Blaze Hill and Fingland Fell, was a very narrow single road with limited passing places which dictated lengthly reversing manouvers when vehicles met. This project, which created new passing places and enhanced exisiting spaces, received an award of £70,000 to realise a total spend of £165,200 with cofunding from Dumfries and Galloway Council to reduce the impacts of 258,700 tonnes of timber in the next ten years.

In summary, the 2024-25 STTS cycle awarded £901,158 grant support towards nine road improvement projects which realised a total spend of £1,880,330 through cofunding partnerships to reduce the impact of just under 4m tonnes of timber being transported over the next decade.

4.3 Small Projects

Since 2020, the Small Projects budget is a limited, discretionary fund which is used to support strategically important projects. Examples include refreshing the <u>Timber Exit Point Data for Scotland</u> (2020), <u>Timber Lorry Strapping Auto tensioner Demonstrations</u> (2020), FISA Haulage Training Videos about <u>Fragile Roads</u> and <u>Forest Certification</u> (2021), and supporting Creel Maritime in hosting the Irish Forest Industries Transport Group (FITG) knowledge exchange tour in 2023 (Fig. 7). In 2024, Small Projects made an award to deliver Conlict Resolution and Mediation Training for the Project Officers.

4.4 Preparatory Project Grants

Because the STTF is an annual fund it can be difficult for complex or large-scale projects to be investigated, planned and delivered so, in February 2017, Preparatory Project Grants (PPGs) were piloted. PPGs applications are much smaller and can be submitted through the normal STTS channels at any time but are subject to a similar assessment and scoring process as the main scheme. Like the wider scheme, PPGs are cofunded by the applicants. It is expected that PPGs will lead to a full scale STTS project but this is not conditional.

Since, 28 PPGs have been awarded. These included projects to help develop public road projects in the Highlands, Angus and Perth and Kinross; coastal shipping options on Arran, and the development of timber transport options on Morvern. PPG funding was allocated to progress a proposed Rannoch rail project in 2018. In 2019 PPGs were awarded for works on the B9090 Clephanton and at Glenelg.

In 2020, the PPGs looked at proposals for the development of Holyport, Dunoon, the option to use the Glen Croe forest road as a timber bypass to the A82 at the Rest & be Thankful, a study of the status of bridges on timber transport routes in the Highlands, and a proposal for an in-forest route at Barbeth, New Abbey in Dumfries and Galloway. In 2021 PPG funding was allocated to develop potential timber by rail projects at Rannoch and Altnabreac and prepare public road projects in Highland. Preparatory work for a planned trial of zero-emission HGVs (which became EV Timhaul (Fig. 10 and section 4.6) also received a grant then in 2022, only one PPG was awarded wherein, the Highland Council was allocated funding to assess works for timber transport route improvements.

More recently, 2023 saw one PPG delivered which was exploring the feasibility and costing of a new road connecting Highlandman's Wood, Torr Wood and Letrault and Stuckenduff Woodland Creation with the A818 near Rhu in the Argyll and Bute region. And most recently, four PPGs were delivered in 2024. These included awards to Holmen Iggesund for investigative works to understand the scale of repairs needed to make the pier at Lochaline operational, Stirling Council for investigative and planning works for a project to upgrade the C33 at Balquhidder, Angus Council for investigative and planning works on the C27 and C28 in Glen Prosen, and Argyll and Bute Council to assess the scale and scope of works required to restore the A884. All 2024 PPGs were completed.

4.5 Other applications

From the original 18 applications, 9 were either rejected or failed to compete for the available funds. Further, over the couse of the year it was found that one of the awarded projects was no longer viable and was therefore withdrawn and the funding redistributed to extend other schemes.

4.6 Electric Timber Trucks trial

With estimates of 650 timber lorries operating in the UK and recognising their importance in forestry businesses framed against plans to stop selling diesel HGVs in 2045, alongside the industries drive towards sustainable business, decarbonisation pathways are a key consideration for future supply chains.

Scottish Forestry continues to support a three-year pilot trial of two electric timber lorries supported by Scottish timber haulage companies Creel Maritime, James Jones and Sons and Scotlog, which was designed to explore and overcome barriers faced by timber haulage during transition of heavy freight from away from fossil fuels to zero emission Battery Electric Vehicles (BEVs). Although EVs are a common sight now, 44 tonne BEVs are still very new and were, at the time, completely untested in forestry applications.

The project team are very pleased to report the trial is currently midway through year two with both lorries now settled into operations and performing well. For more information please see the <u>EV Timhaul year 1</u> report.

4.7 TimberLINK

<u>TimberLINK</u> is a Public Service Contract supporting shipping timber from Argyll to mainland Scotland across the Firth of Clyde, as an alternative to a 190-mile road haul on sensitive rural roads including the A83, A82, and various trunk roads in Ayrshire. Annually, the service cuts almost 4,000 lorry journeys avoiding 926,000 lorry miles and 1,200 tonnes emissions.

5. Financial Expenditure

The STTF budget for the period April 2024–March 2025 was £2m for the year, covering both STTS projects and TimberLINK. The total expenditure (and allocation to date on current projects) from the start of the scheme (in 2005) until March 2025 for the STTS (excluding TimberLINK) was £69m, delivering £132m worth of projects⁶.

6. Timber Haulage

STTF projects delivered in 2025-26 will reduce the impacts of more than 4m tonnes of timber over the next decade.

7. Conclusions

The scheme continues to enhance sustainable timber transport in Scotland by providing a focal point for innovative and strategic projects that reduce impacts on communities and the environment including in-forest roads, upgraded public roads, and promoting modal shift options.

To date, the STTS can be considered a success in that it has met its aims by:

- Galvanising local authorities and forest businesses to find agreed solutions to minimising the impacts of timber transport on local communities and prioritising scarce financial resources to maintain strategically important rural road networks.
- Encouraging partnership approaches with public and private bodies leveraging significant uplifts in available budget through cofunding to maximise opportunities to reduce the impacts of timber transport on local communities and fragile rural roads.
- Promoting multi- and trans- disciplinary multiagency collaborations towards future-fit, low-carbon, low-impact supply chains.
- Enhancing the social, environmental and economic benefits of forestry value chains for Scotland.

Current and future challenges:

- Transport Scotland contributions to STTS were reduced to £4m 2023-24 and ceased in 2024 therefore available budget for the 2025-26 cycle will be £2m such that less projects can be delivered overall.
- Mounting resourcing and financial pressure for local authority roads budgets is reducing opportunity to leverage co-funding with some regions currently pausing applications.
- Reduced frequency of maintenance and repair as a function of budgetary constraints is accelerating deterioration compounding negative perceptions of forest businesses increasing repair costs, and the risk of landlocked forests in future years.
- Geopolitical instability is leading to significant increases in costs for materials such as metals and bitumen making project planning increasingly difficult.




